Question 1

A 53-year-old man presents for routine physical examination. He has not seen a physician in 8 years. He has a family history of premature cardiovascular disease, and smokes 10 to 12 cigarettes daily. He has a sedentary lifestyle. Examination showed no obvious signs of renovascular disease.

BMI	41
Heart rate	92 /min
Temperature	36.9o C
Blood pressure	185/112mmHg
Respiratory rate	12 /min

Which of the following is the most likely diagnosis?

- A. Prehypertension
- B. Stage 1 hypertension
- C. Stage 2 hypertension

- D. Using medical terms that the patient understands
